

Playwright reflects on a long career

William H. Lawrie Jr., a former Independence resident, was a founder of a black theater troupe

By his own admission, play-wright William H. Lawrie Jr. has passed up many opportunities in show business.

But the 80-year-old former Independence resident said he does not regret the choices he made and has had a pleasant existence anyway. "Life has been really fascinating to me," Lawie said. "I have met some really interesting people."

to the exhibit. Other well-known persons Lawrie has known are poet Langston Hughes, with whom he founded a black theater troupe in Los Angeles; television host Arthur Gottey who hird him as Arthur Godrey, who hired him as a chef; stars Tony Curtis, Harry Belafonte, Bea Arthur and Rod Steiger, with whom he attended a New York acting school







